Mrs Eagland's top tips for engaging in Maths:

Make it fun, play games, challenges or make stories out of it
Use practical resources - pasta, buttons etc work just as well as counters

and resources in school

By measuring their height and working out how much they've grown
Practise on car journeys - playing number-plate games, adding and subtracting with road signs, thinking about speed by dividing distance by time

• Practise at the shops - weighing fruit and vegetables, budgeting with pocket money, working out the relative value of products by comparing prices and weight

• In the kitchen - with weighing and measuring, and temperature and timings

• By making models and origami shapes

• By playing games together– jigsaws, monopoly, top trumps, match attax cards
